Young students of history will find that this book is a good introduction to how the Declaration of Independence was drafted and signed. The author highlights the bravery of all men who signed the documents as brave men who risked their lives with a single stroke of the pen.

Emma's Poem: The Voice of the Statue of Liberty by Linda Glaser with paintings by Claire A. Nivola
In concise and clear text, the story of Emma Lazarus' dedication to helping Eastern European immigrants as they came to America is told. These same immigrants, who were not wealthy but shared the same Jewish faith as Emma, were the inspiration for her poem which is memorialized on the pedestal of the Statue of Liberty.

Farmer George Plants a Nation by Peggy Thomas, Layne Johnson (Illustrator)

This book provides an interesting perspective about our first president. Linking his love of his home Mount Vernon and his vision for innovating tools to improve farming methods, the author points out how Washington's leadership in the farming industry crossed over into his ability to lead American troops and eventually the nation as the first president.

Father of the Constitution: A Story About James Madison by Barbara Mitchell, illustrated by Alex Tavoularis Readers will be surprised to learn that James Madison, who loved to debate, was painfully shy and would rather listen to arguments than play an active part. Because of his great love for this country, he overcame his shyness and became one of American's most admired and beloved leaders.

The Flag We Love by Pam Munoz Ryan

A full-color tribute and lyrical journey through the history of our nation's flag.

Founder's Key: The Divine and Natural Connection between the Declaration and the Constitution and What We Risk By Losing It by Larry A. Arnn

Arnn's keen writing illuminates the difference in the two key documents of Early American History and how instrumental both are to holding up our government. A powerful reminder of how both documents are not living documents but the framework to our unique system of government.

George vs. George: The American Revolution as Seen From Both Sides by Rosalyn Schanzer


A unique book that takes to heart the idea of "two sides to every story". Readers will find it engaging, enlightening and educational.
